• EXCITING NEWS FROM THE NY PH PBRN. The NY PH PBRN recently completed the first phase of a two-part research project about evidence-based decision making (EBDM) in local health departments (LHDs). The research aims to identify facilitators and barriers of EBDM, and opportunities to increase its use in this setting. It is hoped that dissemination of the

research findings will enhance and reinforce EBDM, especially among people in leadership positions. After completing an extensive literature review of EBDM, the first phase was a qualitative study that consisted of 25 individual and small-group interviews with commissioners, health directors, and upper-level staff with decision-making responsibilities. Two focus groups of eight people each were also conducted. Approximately half of the local health departments in New York State were represented in the sample. Participants supported the use of EBDM and expressed a desire to improve their department's use of it. While most people interviewed had a basic understanding of EBDM, only a few had substantial expertise and practice experience. Many indicated that they applied EBDM unevenly and utilized only certain aspects of it. The participants identified barriers of EBDM and facilitators to increase its use. They described two tiers of decision making: "big picture" decisions that were usually made by agency heads, and "day-to-day" decisions that still benefit from an evidence-based approach. Barriers and facilitators included the workforce and their competencies, management configurations, and working with local legislatures. Information from the qualitative phase will guide the development of a quantitative survey of all local health departments to assess EBDM practices and their determinants. A steering committee made up of all the PBRN partners has guided the research from its inception.

Dissemination Opportunity. PBRNs that have research findings ready for dissemination are strongly encouraged to consider the CDC's *Morbidity and Mortality Weekly Report (MMWR)* as a venue. Findings from QIQSs and QSRFs are especially suited for the *MMWR* in that they are intended for rapid impact. Publishing in the *MMWR* will not preclude publication later in a peer-reviewed journal. Every piece submitted to the *MMWR* must have a CDC sponsor and, if possible, a state health agency sponsor. The NCC will be happy to assist in facilitating the CDC connection and advising on the appropriateness of the *MMWR* as an avenue for dissemination. - National Healthcare Quality & Disparities Reports. The 2010 National Healthcare Quality & <u>Disparities</u> Reports have been released by the Agency for Healthcare Research and Quality (AHRQ). Although the reports focus on clinical care, there are lessons for Public Health.
- ★ The association of changes in local health department resources with changes in state-level health outcomes. An article in the April issue of <u>American Journal of Public Health</u> by Dr. Paul Erwin, Dr. Sandra Green, Dr. Glen Mays, Dr. Thomas Ricketts, and Dr. Mary Davis describes the results of a retrospective cohort study, utilizing information obtained from the 1997 and 2005 National Association of County and City Health Officials surveys, in which they examined the relationship between local health department (LHD) resource levels and health outcomes. Results of the study demonstrated a statistically significant (P=.037) association between increases in LHD expenditures and decreases in infectious disease, and a statistically significant (P=.014) association between increased staff and decreased cardiovascular disease mortality.
