- ▶ PH PBRN Assessment. The NCC recently conducted a two-part assessment aimed to gather information about: the status of research projects; lessons learned (challenges and facilitators in development of PBRN); sustainability plans; and recommendations to the NCC. Grantee participation in this study was greatly appreciated. Eleven of the 12 grantees participated in the online assessment, and 100 percent participated in the semi-structured interviews. Findings will be presented at the annual grantee meeting.
- ★ Evidence-Based Practice Webinar by Ross Brownson, Ph.D. On Tuesday, April 26, 2:00-3:30 p.m. We invite you to extend this invitation to the Public Health PBRN Quarterly Webinar to your network partners and others.

- ❖ Congratulations! Dr. Mary Jo Baisch (WI PBRN) has been invited to present the findings of the Quick Strike project, "A Systematic Method to Document Population-Level Nursing Interventions in an Electronic Health System," at the AcademyHealth Annual Research Meeting in June.
- → Dissemination Opportunity. PBRNs that have research findings ready for dissemination are strongly encouraged to consider the CDC's Morbidity and Mortality Weekly Report (MMWR) as a venue. Findings from QIQSs and QSRFs are especially suited for the MMWR in that they are intended for rapid impact. Publishing in the MMWR will not preclude publication later in a peer-reviewed journal. Every piece submitted to the MMWR must have a CDC sponsor and, if possible, a state health agency sponsor. The NCC will be happy to assist in facilitating the CDC connection and advising on the appropriateness of the MMWR as an avenue for dissemination. We encourage networks to consider what findings they may have ready to disseminate, and let us know any thoughts you may have on content, timing, venues, etc.

▶ NACCHO Annual. Kudos to Matthew Stefanak (Ohio PBRN) for spearheading the submission of a PH PBRN panel abstract. Matt will moderate for the session. William Livingood (FL PBRN), David Gregorio (CT PBRN), and Julie Myhre (MN PBRN) will be presenters for a sharing session at the NACCHO Annual 2011 Conference, July 20-22 at the Connecticut Convention Center in downtown Hartford. The session title is Practice-Based Research Networks: Applied Systems Research to Inform Local Public Health Policy. Calls for Abstracts/Proposals/Presentations/Review

- Integrating Primary Care and Public Health. A joint AHRQ-HRSA-CDC-NIH <u>Call for Papers</u> has been released. AHRQ is co-sponsoring with HRSA, CDC and the NIH a special journal supplement on primary care and public health. Manuscripts are due to <u>AJPH</u> on August 1. For further information, please contact the guest editors at <u>AJPH-AJPMPapers@hrsa.gov</u>.
- → Health Impact Project. A Call for Proposals (CFP) has been issued for the Health Impact Project: Advancing Smarter Policies for Healthier Communities, a collaboration of RWJF and The Pew Charitable Trusts. This CFP is for organizations that wish to undertake a health impact assessment as a way to demonstrate their value in policymaking. Grants will range from \$25,000 to \$125,000 and must be completed within 18 months. Up to eight projects will be awarded. Deadline for brief online proposals: June 1, 5:00 p.m. EDT.
- → Call for Policy-Relevant PHSSR Findings: Will your research produce evidence regarding the effectiveness and value of investments in the public health system? Several Public Health PBRNs are studying related issues such as uses of funding streams, responses to economic shocks, and efforts to reconfigure delivery systems for improved capabilities and efficiency. As your network gathers early findings and preliminary evidence, please let the NCC know so that we can help you think through dissemination opportunities with policymakers. There are some very effective vehicles for rapid release of early findings that will not preclude subsequent opportunities for publication of scientific articles. - ▶ Public Health Blog. The Robert Wood Johnson Foundation (RWJF) has just launched a public health blog. The public health blog will be a great resource for keeping up with all the exciting discussions occurring at the upcoming Keeneland conference, in addition to links to and from Scutch's blog. - ▶ Investing in America's Health. Trust for America's Health (TFAH) and the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation (RWJF) have released an annual report, <u>Investing in America's Health: A State-By-State Look At Public Health Funding And Key Health Facts</u> and new <u>state pages</u>. The annual report explores public health funding and health key facts in states around the country. The state pages provide state-specific public health data and information on funding, preparedness and compare states on each specific health indicator.
- New Data Confirm Job Losses and Program Cuts in LHDs Continue. Results from NACCHO's Job Losses and Program Cuts Survey show that local health departments (LHDs) lost 29,000 jobs to layoffs and attrition between January 2008 and December 2010, roughly 19 percent of the 2008 nationwide LHD workforce. In 2010, 18,000 LHD employees were subjected to reduced hours or mandatory furloughs. State-level analysis of budget, staffing, and program cuts data from the 2010 National Profile of Local Health Departments Survey will be available in early April. Funding Opportunities and Announcements

The PBRN National Coordinating Center maintains a <u>list of funding opportunities</u> of interest to Public Health PBRNs. Grant opportunities with recurring deadlines are tracked and updated. Here are opportunities available now:

- ▶ Public Health Law Research (PHLR) Program. The 2011 Call for Proposals Round 3 from the PHLR program has been released, with \$2.85 million available. The PHLR Program is a national initiative of the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation. Deadline for receipt of brief proposals: April 20, 3 p.m. ET.
- → Junior Investigators. New Connections-Junior Investigator Program has released a <u>Call</u> for <u>Proposals</u>. RWJF will select up to a total of 13 *Junior Investigator* grants of up to \$75,000 each for 24 months. Brief Proposal Deadline: May 5, 3:00 p.m. ET.
- → AHRQ Research Centers for Excellence in Clinical Preventive Service. AHRQ has made \$4.5 million available to fund three research centers with a focus on one of the following programmatic areas: patient safety, health equity, or health care system implementation. The project period is for three years with a \$1.5 million annual budget for each year. For more information, click on <u>RFA-HS-11-005</u>. Deadlines: Letters of intent, April 29 and applications, May 23.
- → HRSA Affordable Care Act Public Health Training Center (PHTC) program. This program will provide funding for a four-year project period. Estimated total program funding is \$6.5 million with an award ceiling of \$650,000. Please view the funding announcement, HRSA-11-142, for more information. Deadline: May 23.
- ▶ Round Two: Digging into Data Challenge. Eight international research funders have announced their joint support for round two of the Digging into Data Challenge, a grant competition designed to encourage cutting edge research in the humanities and social sciences. - ▶ RWJF Healthy Eating Research. The RWJF Healthy Eating Research: Building Evidence to Prevent Childhood Obesity program has released its 2011 Call for Proposals. The Rapid-response award concept papers are due August 2.

How can PBRNs "scale up" by pursuing coordinated sets of research questions, standardized research designs involving multiple states and large numbers of practice settings, pooled data collection strategies and registries, etc?
