✔ Golden Opportunities. A plethora of funding opportunities are available that can be used to support public health services and systems research (PHSSR) projects conducted through public health PBRNs. These include the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation's (RWJF) call for investigator-initiated <u>PHSSR</u> proposals, the University of Kentucky's funding for <u>dissertation research</u> and junior faculty career development, the CDC's <u>PRC-SIP</u> funding that specifically encourages collaboration with PBRNs, <u>AHRQ's special emphasis research funding</u> for underserved populations and population health, and NIMHD's funding for <u>minority health and health disparities research</u>. These and other funding sources represent golden opportunities for reaching out to engage research partners for possible collaboration through public health

PBRNs. As the behavioral economists remind us, collective action is mobilized through incentives, and research funding always drives behavior in the scientific community.

- Reminder! Annual Grantee Meeting Reimbursement Requests. The Public Health PBRN NCC will pay or reimburse the following travel expenses associated with this meeting:
 - Two nights of lodging at the conference hotel (Sunday and Monday nights). Tuesday night lodging is reimbursable for PBRN panelists only
 - Round-trip, coach airfare (paid by the Coordinating Center to Directravel)
 - Round-trip cab fare between the Lexington airport and conference hotel if hotel courtesy car service is unavailable
 - Meals not provided at the meeting, up to a maximum of \$61 per day for up to three days (April 10 through April 12). *Original itemized receipts must be submitted.*
 - Up to three days of airport parking at home airport (April 10 through April 12)

- ★ AcademyHealth Annual Research Meeting. AcademyHealth recently released its conference agenda, and multiple sessions each day will appeal to PH PBRN practitioners and researchers. - NACCHO Annual 2011. PH PBRN representatives Matt Stefanak (Ohio), David Gregorio (Connecticut), Bill Livingood (Florida), and Julie Myhre (Minnesota) have been invited to serve on a panel, "Practice-Based Research Networks: Applied Systems Research to Inform Local Public Health Policy" at the NACCHO conference, July 20-22 in Hartford, Conn.

Research Dissemination Opportunities

- Science of Community Engagement. The Clinical & Translational Science Awards (CTSA) has issued a <u>Call for Papers</u> focusing on the science of community engagement for a special issue of the journal, *Progress in Community Health Partnerships: Research, Education, and Action.* The call specifically invites PBRN contributions and prioritizes papers that are collaborative and co-authored by community members. The deadline for submitting papers is Monday, August 1.
- Integrating Primary Care and Public Health. The American Journal of Public Health and the American Journal of Preventive Medicine are planning a joint issue addressing the question: "How do we improve population health and promote health equity through the effective integration of primary care and public health?" A multi-agency <u>Call for Papers</u> seeks submissions in the areas of science, education, practice, and policy and especially invites submissions co-authored by professionals in the public health and primary care fields. Manuscripts are due by August 1.
- ★ Call for Policy-Relevant PHSSR Findings. Will your research produce evidence regarding the effectiveness and value of investments in the public health system? Several Public Health PBRNs are studying related issues such as uses of funding streams, responses to economic shocks, and efforts to reconfigure delivery systems for improved capabilities and efficiency. As your network gathers early findings and preliminary evidence, please let the NCC know so that we can help you think through dissemination opportunities with policymakers that will not preclude subsequent publication of scientific articles. REPORTS AND PUBLICATIONS

New NACCHO Data. NACCHO has published a <u>preliminary report</u> of its fall 2010 survey on local health department (LHD) job losses and program funding cuts. These state-level data show the impact of ongoing financial strain on the ability of local health departments to serve and protect the health of their communities.

New Literature and Exemplary Studies of Interest

Smoke-Free Laws. An analysis of progress toward the Healthy People 2010 objective of enacting laws in all 50 states and the District of Columbia to eliminate smoking in public places and worksites is published in the April 22 issue of <u>MMWR</u>.

PREVIOUSLY ANNOUNCED LISTINGS

★ National Institute on Minority Health and Health Disparities (NIMHD). According to the FOA, "priority topic areas for projects include: 1) information and communications technologies to increase access to care, 2) policies or initiatives to increase the supply of rural healthcare practitioners and/or the use of paraprofessionals or peer-led health services to supplement existing healthcare services, 3) strategies to organize, manage, finance, and deliver high quality care, and 4) translational and trans-disciplinary research linking the social determinants of health and health disparities that is innovative, rigorous and well grounded in appropriate theoretical framework. Projects should focus on improving healthcare for all individuals belonging to the target population within a local or regional catchment area of specific health care services or systems rather than for individuals with a particular health disease/condition (e.g., adults with type 2 diabetes living in rural areas). Applicants should have demonstrated partnerships with healthcare organizations, local or state governments, professional provider organizations, patient/consumer advocacy groups, or other relevant collaborators to ensure the feasibility and eventual impact of projects." Deadlines: Letter of Interest, May 8; Application: June 8.

- Accreditation Preparation. NACCHO has announced a new funding opportunity for LHDs to engage in community health assessments and community health improvement plans. The program will award 12 competitive grants of \$35,000 each. Visit the NACCHO website for additional information. Application deadline: May 23.
- ★ AHRQ Research Centers for Excellence in Clinical Preventive Service. AHRQ has made \$4.5 million available to fund three research centers with a focus on one of the following programmatic areas: patient safety, health equity, or health care system implementation. The project period is for three years with a \$1.5 million annual budget for each year. For more information, click on <u>RFA-HS-11-005</u>. Application deadline: May 23.
- Public Health Services and Systems Research. RWJF has released a <u>CFP</u> for PHSSR. Approximately \$2.7 million has been made available in this round of funding for up to 14 awards. Grantees will receive up to \$200,000 each to be used over a 24-month period. Brief Proposal deadline: May 24, 2011.
- Dissertation Research. RWJF has released a <u>Call for Proposals</u> for the Assuring the Future of Public Health Systems & Services Research: Dissertation Grant Program for pre-doctoral dissertation applicants. Deadline for receipt of online proposals: June 1.
- ★ Health Impact Project. A <u>CFP</u> has been issued for the Health Impact Project: Advancing Smarter Policies for Healthier Communities, a collaboration of RWJF and The Pew Charitable Trusts. This CFP is for organizations that wish to undertake a health impact assessment as a way to demonstrate their value in policymaking. Grants will range from \$25,000 to \$125,000 with 18-month project periods. Up to eight projects will be awarded. Deadline for brief online proposals: June 1.



SIPS. CDC's Prevention Research Centers <u>Special Interest Project Competitive Supplements</u> (SIPS) are available to universities housing PRCs. Application deadline: June 1.

- Round Two: Digging into Data Challenge. Eight international research funders have announced a grant competition designed to encourage cutting-edge research in the humanities and social sciences. - ✤ HHS Preparedness. CDC's <u>Public Health Emergency Preparedness Cooperative Agreement</u> <u>Program</u>. Note eligibility requirements and opportunities for collaboration. Application deadline: June 17.

- ★ RWJF Healthy Eating Research. The RWJF Healthy Eating Research: Building Evidence to Prevent Childhood Obesity program has released its 2011 <u>Call for Proposals</u>. The rapid-response award concept papers are due August 2.
- RWJF Public Health Law Research Rapid Response Studies. Proposals accepted online on a rolling basis. Details available in the <u>CFP</u>.
