Notable Activities This Week

- ✓ Help us get the word out. The Public Health PBRN Round II Call for Proposals is generating a great deal of interest! Coordinating Center crew is busy on the phones and a web conference for applicants is scheduled for Thursday, April 30, at 1:30 pm ET. In this round up to 10 grantees will be selected to join the initial cohort of 5 grantees in developing public health PBRNs. - ✓ Washington PBRN has its first full network meeting coming up on April 30 and will work on its research agenda. Good luck, and we will all look forward to hearing about it on the May 12th call.
- Cross-cutting PBRN Research and Evaluation Activities. Coordinating center staff are also continuing to work on possible research activities that will yield comparative information on how public health research networks develop and evolve over time, along with information about important, cross-cutting issues in public health practice. We mentioned a few articles on interorganizational network analysis in last week's newsletter (in the journals <u>HSR</u> and <u>ARPH</u>). If you need access to these or other articles mentioned in the newsletters, let us know and we'll get them for you.
- ✓ PBRN Technical Assistance. Coordinating center staff have developed an initial searchable database of public health research and practice consultants who are available to consult with PBRN grantees on a variety of topics relevant to developing and conducting research with PBRNs. This database along with a web-based form to request more information and indicate other TA needs will be launched on the PBRN website very shortly. While we work out the technical aspects, feel free to contact coordinating center staff directly with TA needs or requests for specific consultants.

Related Research and Practice Activities

• States foresee trouble evaluating impact of stimulus spending. A new GAO report suggests that many states are concerned about their ability to ensure accountability and

impact of the new funding made available through federal stimulus activities -- much of which is intended for health programs. According to the report, about two-thirds of this year's funding will go toward health programs because these needs typically are more pressing than other issues. The report is available <u>online</u>. Practice-based research studies could play a role in documenting the effects of stimulus spending within public health systems, as the Washington PBRN is now contemplating.

- A public health salary cap? The Florida legislature is contemplating a cap on salaries that county health departments pay to health professionals who work under contract to the departments. The state association of counties is scrambling to blunt this proposal, according to a news story by <u>Health News Florida</u>. The state contributes about 30% of county health department funding. One provision of the proposed budget would eliminate partnerships between eight counties and federally qualified health centers to hire professional staff. Practice-based research is needed to inform these types of policy decisions—and to evaluate their impact on service delivery and outcomes.

- **Opportunity for Input from the Public Health Community until April 30!** The Public Health Accreditation Board (PHAB) is holding a public review and comment period for the draft standards, measures and documentation guidance related to the voluntary national accreditation standards for state, local, and territorial public health departments. Revisions of the standards depend upon feedback from the public health community, and PHAB makes a variety of input mechanisms available on its website: http://phaboard.org.
 - Input for Comparative Effectiveness Research Priorities. The Federal Coordinating Council for Comparative Effectiveness Research recently held the first of three listening sessions in which interest groups and the public can express how they believe the \$1.1 billion from the stimulus package for comparative effectiveness research should be spent. The next hearings are tentatively scheduled for May 6 and May 13. At least one meeting is expected to be held outside of Washington, D.C. http://www.hhs.gov/recovery/programs/os/cerbios.html

Recent PHSSR Literature

- In addition to the review on diffusion research by Larry Green (profiled in last week's newsletter), the brand new 2009 volume of the <u>Annual Review of Public Health</u> contains an extremely useful review on strategies that facilitate and inhibit evidence-based practice in public health—by the well-known practice-based researchers Ross Brownson, Jonathan Fielding, and colleagues. This paper provides an excellent foundation for PBRNs interested in studying the adoption of evidence-based practices within and across their networks.
- The upcoming May 2009 issue of <u>American Journal of Public Health</u> contains several commentaries relevant to public health systems and services research,

including a discussion on "Measuring the Value of Public Health Systems" triggered by an earlier article by PHSSR scholars Peter Neumann and Peter Jacobson (based on their recent RWJF-funded study), and a discussion on public health workforce enumeration issues by consummate workforce researcher Chris Gebbie.

Funding Opportunities for Public Health Systems Research

- Systems Research for Population Health: This NIH program announcement looks particularly well suited for practice-based research in public health. *Using Systems Science Methodologies to Protect and Improve Population Health (R21)*. The FOA solicits Exploratory/Developmental (R21) applications from institutions/organizations that propose to apply one or more specific system science methodologies to "policy resistant" public health problems and contribute knowledge that will enhance effective decision making around the development of and prioritization of policies, interventions, and programs to improve population health in the U.S. and abroad, especially where resources are limited and only a limited number of programs/policies/interventions can be implemented. - The next deadline for new applicants *appears* to be June 16. Deadlines are a moving target in the world of ARRA funding, however, so the wise potential applicant would check closely!
- Call for Proposals for Research on Public Health Law! In the first round of funding, short-term, less-complex studies such as policy analysis or public health implications of specific laws or regulations will be funded up to \$150,000 each for up to 18 months. Complex and comprehensive legal and public health studies including long-term analyses and in-depth evaluations will be funded up to \$400,000 each for up to 30 months. - NIH GO Grants. A recently-announced component of the NIH Recovery funds is the Research and Research Infrastructure "Grand Opportunities" or "GO" grants program. GO grant key dates differ from other ARRA application dates, so be sure to check specific opportunities of interest. • The William T. Grant Foundation has issued a RFP for research "on the factors that affect policy makers' and practitioners' acquisition, interpretation, and use of research evidence. Grant awards ranging from \$100,000 to \$600,000 for direct and indirect costs for two to three years of work anticipated. Visit <u>www.wtgrantfoundation.org/</u> for complete program guidelines.
