Notable Recent Activities

- **Round II January Conference Call.** In the first monthly call since orientation, representatives of the seven networks reviewed the Early Activities for Public Health PBRNs document and discussed action steps for establishing infrastructure in the early steering committee and full network meetings. Networks were encouraged to adopt agreements addressing the organization's mission, plans, governance, membership, decision-making, and roles. Identifying and developing communication mechanisms and patterns that best fit the network was emphasized, noting that routine communication should begin quickly. PBRNs were encouraged to establish and maintain inventories of participants' interests, skills and resources related to all aspects of research in public health practice-based settings and success in multi-organization collaboration.

National Coordinating Center (NCC) staff reported on the program's evaluation activity to characterize the early stages of public health PBRN development using social network analysis instrumentation. Baseline data of Round I network activity are being collected after one year, though Round II activity may be measured earlier. Sylvia Porchia described the NCC's initiative to coordinate conference calls and/or communication mechanisms devoted to special interest topics. The topics generated on both cohorts' January calls will be emailed to networks to indicate interest, volunteer to lead or co-lead calls, and add ideas.

All seven networks reported steering committee or other leadership meetings in January and February, as well as other early communication, infrastructure development, and research project activities.

Activities on the Horizon

- **PBRN Annual Grantee and NAC Meetings.** Plans for the Annual Grantee Meeting in conjunction with the PHSSR Keeneland Conference are taking shape. Grantees should arrive in time to meet on Monday morning, April 19, and conclude on Tuesday afternoon, April 20. The NAC also will meet on Tuesday, April 20.

- **Time-Sensitive Research in Environmental Health Sciences.** NIH has announced availability of the two funding mechanisms to “support research in which an unpredictable opportunity has arisen to collect human or animal biosample baseline or exposure data (e.g., following natural or made-made disasters, health care policy changes; etc). The distinctive element of the project should be the need for empirical study for a situation that was not foreseeable and is achievable only if begun within a short time frame.”

- **Environmental Health Specialists Network (EHS-Net) Research (U01) Grant.** CDC’s EHS-Net grant aims to strengthen environmental health service programs through a network of environmental health specialists who will work with epidemiologists and laboratorians in the areas of foodborne and waterborne illnesses. - **Trusted Health Web Sites.** The Medical Library Association (MLA) recently named Ohio’s [NetWellness.org](#) to its annual “Top 100 List: Health Websites You Can Trust.” The site, with its 55,000 pages of health information, is maintained by Case Western Reserve University College of Medicine, The Ohio State University’s College of Public Health, and the University of Cincinnati College of Medicine. All three schools are partners in the **Ohio Public Health PBRN**, known locally as the Ohio Research Association for Public Health Improvement (RAPHI).
