Call for Policy-Relevant PHSSR Findings: With Congress back in session to consider difficult questions about discretionary federal spending, and with state legislatures convening across the country to respond to continuing budgetary squeezes, there is growing demand for evidence regarding the effectiveness and value of investments in the public health system. Several Public Health PBRNs have research underway that speaks to these issues, including uses of funding streams, responses to economic shocks, and efforts to reconfigure delivery systems for improved capabilities and efficiency. As your network gathers early findings and preliminary evidence from related projects, please let the Coordinating Center know so that we can help you think through dissemination opportunities with policymakers. There are some very effective vehicles for rapid release of early findings that will not preclude subsequent opportunities for publication of scientific articles. PUBLICATIONS, REPORTS, AND TOOLS

Building Community Resilience to Disaster. The Rand Corporation has released a <u>report</u> on community resilience, a key policy issue that has been included in the National Health Security Strategy. The authors conducted a literature review and series of community focus groups which resulted in a discussion of a set of eight levers and five core components for building community resilience, suggested activities for strengthening community resilience, and the identification of challenges to implementation.

- Cross-Jurisdictional Relationships in Local Public Health. Former NACCHO Director Patrick Libbey was commissioned by RWJF to conduct an environmental scan, research and report on collaborative relationships among health departments. He has authored an executive summary of the project's preliminary report. The <u>report</u> is available on the RWJF website.
- ✤ Workplace Wellness Programs Can Generate Savings. An <u>article</u> in the February issue of *Health Affairs* by Katherine Baicker and colleagues describes their meta-analysis of the literature on costs and savings associated with workplace disease prevention and wellness programs. This study found that medical costs fall by about \$3.27 for every dollar spent on wellness programs and that absenteeism costs fall by about \$2.73 for every dollar spent.

- Training on Impact Evaluation Using Randomized Trials. The Abdul Latif Jameel Poverty Action Lab is partnering with NIH to offer a two-day training, March 21-22, that will focus on how to incorporate rigorous impact evaluation methodologies into operations and implementation research. This workshop is not part of the 4th Annual NIH Conference on the Science of Dissemination and Implementation and requires a separate application process.

- U.S. Department of Health and Human Services Healthy People 2020 Action Project. Twenty awards of up to \$35,000 will be administered for projects that highlight multi-sector collaboration and employs Healthy People 2020 concepts. - Public Health Law Research (PHLR) Program. The 2011 <u>Call for Proposals</u> Round 3 from the PHLR program has been released, with \$2.85 million available. The PHLR Program is a national initiative of the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation. Deadline for receipt of brief proposals: April 20, 2011 (3 pm ET).
- **RWJF Healthy Eating Research**. The RWJF Healthy Eating Research: Building Evidence to Prevent Childhood Obesity program has released its 2011 <u>Call for Proposals</u>. Under this CFP, three types of awards are available:
 - Round 6 research grant full proposals (due March 10);
 - Rapid-response award concept papers (due August 2); and
 - RWJF New Connections grants through Healthy Eating Research concept papers are due March 10, 2011.
