Forecasting the Public Health Impact of the Economic Recession: During the August Public Health PBRN Virtual Meeting, Wisconsin's Andrew Reschovsky and Susan Zahner shared findings from a Quick Strike research project that developed a model for forecasting future revenue streams for local health departments within the state. The model produces information to help local public health officials anticipate the financial effects of the recession and recovery, and to plan strategic actions in response. The model accounts for macroeconomic effects on local property tax receipts, state aid to local governments, and federal funding sources, while also incorporating the effects of projected population dynamics. Findings from the model reveal that the agencies likely to experience the largest reductions in per-capita revenue during the 2009-12 period include agencies serving populations over 100,000 residents, agencies offering a limited scope of services (defined as Level One agencies in Wisconsin), and independent agencies that do not operate as part of human service agencies. All of these agencies are projected to experience some degree of "bounce-back" in revenue growth during the 2013-14 period, although the level of growth varies considerably. The information generated by this model promise to be of considerable value to local public health professions and their collaborators, particularly as part of their strategic planning and community health improvement



planning initiatives.

Synergies Between PBRN Research and Workforce Training: The U.S. Health Resources and Services Administration convened the annual meeting of its Public Health Training Centers Program in Rockville, MD late this month to discuss new horizons in workforce development and training. For the first time, HRSA included a session devoted to public health services and systems research (PHSSR) and its current and potential roles in shaping workforce development strategies. As part of this session, the Coordinating Center's Glen Mays profiled the workforce research currently underway through the Public Health PBRNs and the ways in which these types of studies and their findings can be translated, disseminated, and expanded through collaboration with Training Centers. Among the projects profiled were: (1) the Ohio PBRN's Quick Strike study to examine variation in the position descriptions for public health nurses across the state and their concordance with national practice standards; (2) the Washington PBRN study of the effects of a quality improvement intervention to improve workforce diversity in a large local health department; and (3) the Kentucky PBRN's randomized trial of a cultural competency training intervention for local public health staff. The meeting included presentations from several of PBRN leaders and collaborators who are also leaders within HRSA-funded training centers, including Elaine O'Keefe from Yale University and the Connecticut PBRN, Ed Baker from UNC and the North Carolina PBRN, Susan Allan from University of Washington and the Washington PBRN, and Pauline Thomas from UMDNJ and the New Jersey PBRN. Massachusetts Releases Regionalization Toolkit: Boston University along with their colleagues in the Massachusetts PBRN recently released a toolkit to help stakeholders conceptualize and plan for regional cooperation agreements in public health service delivery. Based on their synthesis of research and related experiences regarding the design and implementation of regionalization models, the toolkit offers valuable guidance and examples for communities interested in developing regional public health districts and other models of shared service delivery.

More PBRN Network Analytics Released: The Coordinating Center recently



released customized reports for each public health PBRN containing a more granular battery of measures of network structure and patterns of interaction, based on surveys completed by network participants. These measures can be very useful to PBRNs in revealing with greater clarity the roles that each network participant plays in research collaboration, and in identifying opportunities for expanding and improving this collaboration. Coordinating Center staff are available to provide more customized assistance to individual PBRNs in using their network data. A compendium of the individual PBRN network analysis reports is available here.

MPROVE Networks to Submit Comments on Measure Inventory by August 31: Friday is the deadline for PBRNs who are participating in the Multi-Network Practice and Outcome Variation (MPROVE) Study to submit their comments, edits, and additions to the latest version of the service delivery measure inventory. More than 300 candidate measures have been proposed for inclusion in the inventory. A multi-phase Delphi stakeholder rating process will be initiated next month to select the final set of core measures to be collected and analyzed consistently across local public health settings.

PBRN Quarterly Update Calls. Beginning next week, personnel from the National Coordinating Center will contact each network to ensure that our records and website have the most up-to-date information possible about your ongoing projects and technical assistance needs. Networks will be asked to edit their online overviews to reflect the most recent information about their research, to provide updated partner and contact lists, and to talk with the Coordinating Center about progress, challenges, information dissemination, and translation of outcomes. This will be a terrific opportunity for grantees to raise any concerns or make suggestions about how the Coordinating Center can best support your efforts. We look forward to speaking with you soon.

Urban Institute External Evaluation of RWJF PHSSR Activities. The Public Health PBRNs also can expect to be contacted by Harry Hatry and Randy Bovbjerg, external evaluators for the Urban Institute, who are working closely with the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation and the Public Health PBRN National Coordinating Center to evaluate RWJF's Public Health Services and Systems



Research enterprise. This effort provides an excellent opportunity for all of us to learn what we are doing well, what we can do better, and how we can continue furthering the field. Member networks could be contacted to participate in interviews and/or a network-wide survey. PBRN Research to Address Gaps in the Science of Improvement: Several recent systematic reviews of the research literature have documented gaps in the evidence concerning the effectiveness and impact of quality improvement strategies used both in health care and public health settings. To help reduce these evidence gaps, the September issue of *Frontiers in Public Health Services* and Systems Research will feature findings from a series of PBRN studies conducted over the past year to investigate the implementation and impact of quality improvement (QI) initiatives, accreditation preparation activities, and public reporting initiatives exemplified by the County Health Rankings program. These three types of initiatives represent promising approaches for mobilizing efforts to improve the effectiveness and efficiency of public health delivery. To date, relatively little systematic evidence has been produced about how these approaches are operationalized in public health settings, how public health stakeholders respond to them, and ultimately how they impact service delivery and outcomes. NIEHS Unveils Strategic Plan

On August 1st, NIH's National Institute for Environmental Health Science unveiled its new Strategic Plan, Advancing Science, Improving Health: A Plan for Environmental Health Research, which sets forth eleven goals across eight themes to guide the Institute over the next five years. Goals of specific interest to the Public Health PBRNs include:

- · identifying and responding to emerging environmental threats to human health, on both local and global scales;
- establishing an environmental health disparities research agenda that defines and supports public health and prevention solutions to disparities;
- using knowledge management techniques to create a collaborative environment for the environmental health sciences community;
- increasing scientific literacy nationwide, particularly as it relates to knowledge of environmental exposures;
- evaluating the economic impact of policies, practices, and behaviors that reduce exposure to environmental toxicants and investing in research programs to test how prevention improves public health and minimizes economic burden; and
- promoting communication and collaboration among researchers and stakeholders to advance research translation in the environmental health sciences.

Comments Sought on PCORI Methodology Report: The Patient Centered Outcomes Research Institute seeks public comments on its draft methodology report through September 14, 2012. PCORI is poised to become one of the most powerful forces in health research in the U.S., and a very relevant funding source for PHSSR scholars and public health PBRNs. Publish Rapidly and Publish Often at the Frontiers. Take advantage of the openaccess, peer-reviewed journal Frontiers in Public Health Services and Systems Research to publish early research findings and to highlight the practice and policy implications of your work. When you submit your brief manuscript to Frontiers, you will benefit from a three-stage approach to rapid and widespread dissemination. Stage One: your manuscript will be processed through a rapid, 10-week cycle time between submission, peer review, and publication of accepted manuscripts. Stage Two: After manuscripts appear in Frontiers, they are highlighted in a special department of the American Journal of Preventive Medicine (print and electronic versions), allowing you to reach an even larger audience and helping to drive that audience to your original Frontiers article. Stage Three: if you develop a full scientific manuscript after publishing the initial findings in Frontiers, your full scientific article is eligible to receive expedited review at the American Journal of Preventive Medicine. No other journal offers this level of intensity in dissemination.

Please make sure that you and your PBRN colleagues: (1) sign up to receive article alerts from Frontiers; (2) submit your early findings to Frontiers as soon as you have them in hand, because data are perishable; and (3) agree to serve as a peer reviewer for Frontiers submissions, and occasionally agree to write a commentary for Frontiers on articles that fall within your areas of expertise. Frontiers is your dissemination vehicle – your part of the "open science" movement – so please use it and share it with your colleagues and collaborators.

PCORI Workshops on Community Engagement and Research Prioritization. The Patient-Centered Outcomes Research Institute (PCORI) will host three workshops in Washington, D.C., this fall as part of its effort to engage patients and other health care stakeholders as meaningful and active partners in its efforts to build a patient-centered research community and refine its research agenda. The workshops are designed to obtain input from patients, caregivers and other stakeholders on PCORI's draft process for generating and selecting specific research topics. Once implemented, the process will lead to topic-specific funding announcements that correspond to the five priority areas for research outlined in PCORI's National Priorities for Research and Research Agenda and complement the broad Funding Announcements that PCORI issued in May. Each workshop is designed to encourage participation from a specific group within the health care community. Attendance will be limited, but each workshop will be accompanied by a public, interactive webcast. PCORI is prepared to support travel and related expenses of invited attendees. Workshops:

Transforming Patient-Centered Research: Building Partnerships and Promising Models October 27-28. This workshop will focus on the patient's role and perspective in PCORI's work, and provide an opportunity



for patients, caregivers, advocacy groups, researchers and other stakeholders to start working together as a community to discuss potential ideas for future research. It also will support PCORI's efforts to raise the standards in the science of patient engagement by developing promising policies for identifying research questions, reviewing funding proposals and ensuring patient participation throughout the process. Attendance is limited to 150 people; 75% of workshop invitations will be reserved for patients, caregivers and organizations representing them.

- What Should PCORI Study? A Call for Topics from Patients and Stakeholders December 4. This workshop will be an opportunity to solicit recommendations for specific research topics and test PCORI's draft process for determining which could be the basis of future funding announcements. Attendance is limited to 100 individuals; 25% of invitations will be reserved for patients, caregivers and the organizations that represent them.

Research methodologists, patients and stakeholders will further test the process for selecting research questions and address a number of methodological issues that will help PCORI refine the process to ensure that it addresses the needs of patients and those who care for them. Attendance will be invitation only and limited to 50 individuals due to the event's format.

Time-Sensitive Obesity Policy and Program Evaluation (R01)

Letter of Intent Due: September 12, 2012 (See RFA for additional dates)

Proposal Due: October 10, 2012 (See RFA for additional dates)

This announcement establishes an accelerated review/award process to support time-sensitive research to evaluate a new policy or program expected to influence obesity related behaviors (e.g., dietary intake, physical activity, or sedentary behavior) and/or weight outcomes in an effort to prevent or reduce obesity. This FOA is intended to support research where opportunities for empirical study are, by their very nature, only available through expedited review and funding. All applications to this FOA must demonstrate that the evaluation of an obesity related policy and /or program offers an uncommon and scientifically compelling research opportunity that will only be available if the research is initiated with minimum delay. For these reasons, applications in response to this time-sensitive FOA are eligible for only one submission. It is intended that eligible applications selected for funding will be awarded within 3-4 months after the application submission/receipt date.

Robert Wood Johnson Foundation Scholars in Health Policy Research

Proposal Due: October 16, 2012



The Robert Wood Johnson Foundation Scholars in Health Policy Research program develops and supports a new generation of creative health policy thinkers and researchers within the disciplines of economics, political science and sociology. Each year the program selects up to nine highly qualified individuals for two-year fellowships at one of three nationally prominent universities with the expectation that they will make important research contributions to future U.S. health policy.

NIOSH Exploratory/Developmental Grant Program (R03) and (R21) Proposal Due: October 16, 2012

The purpose of this grant program is to develop an understanding of the risks and conditions associated with occupational diseases and injuries, to explore methods for reducing risks and for preventing or minimizing exposure to hazardous conditions in the workplace, and to translate significant scientific findings into prevention practices and products that will effectively reduce work-related illnesses and injuries.

The New Innovator Awards complement ongoing efforts by NIH and its Institutes and Centers to fund early stage investigators through R01 grants, which continue to be the major sources of NIH support for early stage investigators.

The purpose of this funding opportunity announcement (FOA) is to promote science within the mission of the NICHD Demographic and Behavioral Sciences



Branch by providing research infrastructure to population science research centers. Types of research infrastructure provided include administrative and technical research support, developmental infrastructure, and public infrastructure. This FOA supports three types of applications: (1) General Center applications, for centers with three to six signature population science research themes; (2) Specialized Center applications, for centers with one or two signature research themes; and (3) Translation/Dissemination Center applications, for centers that request funding only for public infrastructure.

This program is authorized by 42 U.S.C. 299a(b), which provides that AHRQ may provide training grants in the field of health services research. National Network of Public Health Institutes Quality Improvement Award Program, Cycle Two

NNPHI will provide health departments with \$5,000 awards, coupled with 15 hours of individualized quality improvement (QI) assistance from an experienced QI Coach, to conduct a QI project that results in measureable change. HRSA Maternal and Child Health Research Program. HRSA has announced the FY2013 iteration of its "R40" MCH research program that "supports applied research relating to maternal and child health services including services for children with special health care needs, which show promise of substantial contribution to advancement of the current knowledge pool, and when used in States and communities should result in health and health services improvements. Findings from the research supported by the MCH Research Program are expected to have potential for application in health care delivery programs for mothers and children. Research proposals should address critical MCH questions such as *public health systems and infrastructure (italics added by PBRN Coordinating Center)*, health disparities, quality of care, and promoting the health of MCH populations, which also support the goals of the Health Resources and Services Administration." Proposals, which are limited to secondary data analysis projects,



are due September 12, 2012.
